Common Core State Standards

Graves Middle School has really beefed up the technology and we are working closely with Spiritt Family Services as they host the Parent Education Series at GMS.

As I mentioned previously, we have increased our use of technology at GMS. First, we now have four full computer labs and an iPad cart for our students and teachers. We are also exploring the possibility of adding an additional portable lab. We are now using the IXL math program and the Moby Max program in our English classes and our reading classes. We are really expanding our use of technology at Graves.

by about 46 states and D.C. Although they are very challenging standards, they are well written and well organized. They are written in a way that you can see how the kids' skills and knowledge are supposed to progress over time. The CCSS also really push kids to think critically, work together, be creative, and communicate effectively. They will also help us focus on technology so that our kids have all the skills they need to function in a global economy with 21st Century technology skills. At GMS we have been training our teachers so they understand the new CCSS and use best teaching strategies so our kids can access these new challenging standards. We are very excited because this is one of the most exhilarating times in public education in the last 50 or more years. We are excited because we know that the CCSS and all the change that will come with it will help us prepare our kids for college or a great career. I will keep you posted on our progress.

Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium (SBAC)

As I mentioned, the state test that our students take is also changing this year. In the past we took the California Standards Test (CST), now we will be taking the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium (SBAC) test. This year results from the SBAC will not be given to the schools, the students, or the parents because it is a "test of the test". In other words, they are deciding what works well with the test, what they will need to change and which test questions to keep and which ones to throw away. But there are some major changes with this new assessment. For example, the CST only had one type of question, a multiple choice question with just one correct answer and it was a paper and pencil test. The Smarter Balanced Assessment will have seven different types of questions and it will be done on computer. The types of questions will include multiple choice with one correct answer, multiple choice with more than one correct answer, short answer written responses, and long answer written responses among other types. So, the level of difficulty of the questions this year will be much harder than before. By next year the computer will adjust the level of difficulty of the questions (both easier and harder) for every student. As you can see, these are exciting times for schools, so I will keep you updated.
